For over 20 years, Ali Taha has volunteered with the Peel Region chapter of Tetra Society of North America. As a professional engineer with a Master of Science and Master of Engineering degree, Ali started his own machine building company upon arriving in Canada from Iraq in 1997 and connected with Tetra's Toronto chapter, volunteering there before moving to the Peel Region three years later. Often working on two projects at the same time, Ali is passionate about the Tetra Society and helping others. Whether it's a mechanical or an electronic build, he tackles any project and is always quick to assist the other volunteers with any problems or snags they might run into. Ali is also a member of the Shriners since 2009 and was able to secure a grant from them so we could purchase an electric car for a project for a child with a spinal defect that he is currently modifying with a joystick to replace the steering wheel and accelerator pedal.

OTTAWA PROJECT Ramping it Up

Although there is a great push to make all venues accessible to people with disabilities, many locations are still not well equipped, keeping people who use mobility devices such as walkers and wheelchairs from accessing them.

Jerry Fiori, Chair of the Ottawa Disability Coalition, approached Paul Marriage, Project Coordinator of the Ottawa Chapter, with a request to design and develop a portable, lightweight ramp that could provide access to buildings with three or four stairs. Ramps needed to be small yet durable enough to use, store, move, and maintain in all environments and weather conditions in accordance with engineering requirements, all while being affordable to produce.

Through an ongoing cooperative arrangements with Algonquin College in Ottawa, this project was assigned to a team of student volunteers (Brandon Guillemette, Fredrick Anyike, Erik Jolliffe, Tiancheng Hu, Ryan Gilpin) under professor Mike Makhoul Rabie, as part of their course requirements. Costing just \$800, these ramps have the potential to greatly enhance the quality of life for a great many people, ensuring they have access to previously inaccessible venues.

Micah first heard of the Tetra Society when he was a Mechanical Engineering student at UBC back in 2018. In this program, students are required to do a year-long project called a CapStone. Micah's group would take on the project presented by Tetra Program Manager Eric Molendyk, creating an automated backpack retrieval system that allowed Eric to independently access his backpack.

After graduating, Micah went on to develop his skills and never lost his passion to help others. In 2020 he joined Tetra's Kelowna chapter, and not even COVID-19 could stop him from working on projects. Since then, he has worked on a a solution to a barrier encountered by many a traveler with a disability: transferring onto hotel beds. Micah made a portable platform that someone in a wheelchair can wheel on to make transfers onto hotel beds, many of which are too tall for a transfer, easier.

"I've always had a heart to help people," said Micah, "the experiences you get from volunteering and helping others is great for your own experience, but also helps someone else, so it's a win-win."
